Under the leadership of Music Director Greg Scimé, the ministry includes cantors, choirs and instrumentalists for all Sunday masses.

The ministry also is supported by a collection of talented and accomplished guest musicians who occasionally accompany the choir during Sunday masses and who are a featured element of the many special concerts that the ministry performs during the year.

The adult choir, which is comprised of about 25 parishioners with beautiful, diverse voices that blend



in unique harmonies, works throughout the year preparing music for our 11:30 a.m. Sunday masses and for our most holy celebrations — Easter and Christmas.

The choir also performs at a variety of special concerts throughout the year, including the most recent Black History Month celebration on Feb. 18.

The Children's Choir, which is made up of youngsters aged 7 to 13, sings at the Sunday 9 a.m. mass.

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Decorating the Church for Holy Week, Easter

Under the leadership of Diana Murphy, the committee decorates the church for the various liturgical seasons of the year. They also maintain the atmosphere for a pleasant worship experience with plants, candles, and banners.

It is a large space to decorate and, through the years, Diana and her crew have come up with innovative, creative ideas that improve with each passing year. As we approach the solemn celebrations associated with Holy Week and Easter, the Art & Environment crew must work quickly and intensely to decorate the church appropriately through the transition from Lent into



the Triduum and finally through to the Easter celebrations, beginning with the Vigil on Holy Saturday evening.

After Morning Prayer and the Blessing of Food on Holy Saturday morning, the crew has only a small window of time to transform the church from the spare decor of Good Friday into the joyous liturgy of Easter on Saturday evening, adorning the church with lilies, hydrangeas, and other expressions of

our collective celebration of Jesus' resurrection.

"Knowledge of good liturgy is essential," said Father Jim Worth. "Diana is on the Liturgy Committee and has been doing this for many years. We are grateful to her and her husband, Ron, who helps do the heavy lifting."
